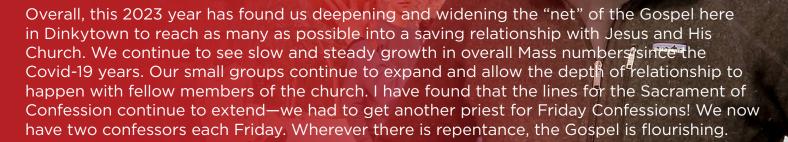
With Pastor and Director, Fr. Jake Anderson

FINANCIAL OVERVIEW

"The best chance to deploy capital is when things are going down." This Warren Buffet quote was repeatedly preached throughout my six years of studying business and finance. Its premise is simple: When taking an institutional view, it means when fair value estimates for a company

are <1.00 or a company is undervalued, stock buybacks can be an effective corporate strategy to increase shareholder value. Now, I like being a shrewd capitalist as much as the next guy, but I would have never thought I would find new meaning from this quote in our current position at St. Lawrence Newman Center.

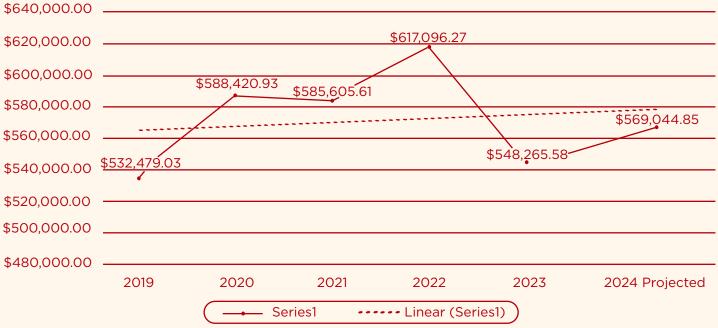
At St. Lawrence Newman Center, and as exhibited in our financial information, we are deploying capital to grow our ministry. Spending increased from fiscal year 2022 to 2023 in key expense areas such as program expense (the money it takes to run our campus ministry outreach and formation), facilities, liturgy (which includes additional priests for availability of the sacraments), and development (so we can continue to expand our ministry in the future to raise up servant leaders in the faith). Explaining the -11% decrease in operating cash flow from FY22 to FY23; however, we are projecting a 3.79% increase in FY24 as our income continues to grow commensurate with our expenses. Now, a shrewd capitalist might ask what has this capital deployment gotten St. Lawrence. For development, we have seen an increase in YoY general fundraising from \$151,807.08 in 2021 to \$305,645.67 in 2023. We continue to keep our facilities operable and welcoming to students. As for the growth and impact on the ministry side, I will leave that up to the experts, Fr. Jake and Br. Matthew, however, we are seeing an increase in young people coming to mass. Thanks to Fr. Jake, Fr. Paul, and Fr. Nels, the sacraments are readily available to students and parishioners. Our household program grew from 19 to 31 students living in households, and our undergraduate Men's and Women's discipleship small groups rose from 124 to 154 students thanks to the efforts of all our campus ministry staff.

It is enlivening and hopeful to see this progress and growth in a ministry while many would say things are "going down." Morals seem to be eroding, church attendance and belief in the true presence of the Eucharist have been declining, and division and hatred are being sowed seemingly everywhere, even inside the Catholic Church. However, when things are going down, there is greater opportunity. In Warren Buffet's case, he is strictly talking about value and money creation; in our case, more and more souls need God's love and mercy and the new life that comes when you follow him. When things are "going down," it is precisely the time when God is calling us to take up our individual crosses that he has gifted us and assess and discern his call to use our earthly talents and resources that he has entrusted to our care. Please continue to pray for St. Lawrence Newman Center and our staff as we continue to determine how to grow, deploy, and utilize our talents and resources wisely, all so we can further reach and form the over 6,000 undergraduate Catholics at the University of Minnesota and raise them up as future leaders in the faith.
